GCSE Exams Class 2025

Introduction

Year 11 is a very important year. Exams, college applications and decisions about the future all come around quicker than you might expect. Mock exam marks will be used by teachers to make predictions about final grades. Colleges and 6th forms will want to know them.

The purpose of this booklet is to provide you with essential information about how to prepare for your mock exams. To achieve well in your GCSEs you need to make the most of the mock experience

The key messages are:

1. Get organised! If you can't do it on your own, get help. Balance your subjects.
2. Start early – there is lots to do, the earlier you start, the more manageable it is, cramming your revision is stressful and not as effective.
3. Make use of all the things the school provides – we only recommend things that make a big difference!

Where can I get resources to revise for my subjects?

The following pages contain the key revision information from every subject. Find your subjects and take note of them!



Subject: English Language (Eduqas)

Number of exams in and length:

- Component 1 - 1 hour and 45 minutes
- Component 2 - 2 hours

Topics that are assessed on each paper:

Component 1 (40%)

Section A – Reading (40 marks) – 20%

This section will test, through structured questions, the reading of an unseen extract from one 20th century literary prose text.

Section B – Writing (40 marks) – 20%

This section will test creative prose (story) writing through one 40-mark task. Candidates will be offered a choice of four titles.

Component 2 (60%)

Section A – Reading (40 marks) – 30%

This section will test, through structured questions, the reading of two high-quality unseen non-fiction texts (about 900-1200 words in total), one from the 19th century, the other from the 21st century.

Section B – Writing (40 marks) – 30%

This section will test transactional, persuasive and/or discursive writing through two equally weighted compulsory tasks (20 marks each). Across the two tasks candidates will be offered opportunities to write for a range of audiences and purposes, adapting style to form and to real-life contexts in, for example, letters, articles, reviews, speeches, etc.

Subject: English Literature (Eduqas)

Number of exams in and length:

- Component 1 - 2 hours
- Component 2 – 2.5 hours

Students are not permitted to take copies of the set texts into the examination.

Topics that are assessed on each paper:

Component 1 (40%)

There are two sections on this paper:

Section A – Shakespeare (20%)

All students study 'Macbeth.' They will be required to write on a given extract from the play and then write a character or theme essay.

Section B – Poetry Anthology (20%)

Two questions based on poems from the WJEC Eduqas Poetry Anthology, one of which involves comparison.

Component 2 (60%)

There are three sections in this paper:

Section A - Post-1914 Prose/Drama (45 minutes) - 20%

Your child will have studied either 'Lord of the Flies' or 'An Inspector Calls.' They will be required to write about a character or theme across the text, using a source-based extract in the exam.

Section B – 19th Century Prose (45 minutes) - 20%

Your child will have studied either 'An Inspector Calls' or 'The Strange Case of Dr Jekyll and Mr Hyde.' They will be required to write about a character or theme across the text, using a source-based extract in the exam.

Section C – Unseen Poetry (1 hour) - 20%

Two questions on unseen poems, one of which involves comparison.

Subject: Maths

Number of exams in and length:

3 papers $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours each, equally weighted.

Paper 1 is non-calculator, papers 2 and 3 are calculator allowed.

Students are provided with a formula sheet in the exam. Students have been given a paper copy to help with revision and an electronic copy can also be found on the maths revision Google Classrooms (details at the bottom of the page)

Topics that are assessed on each paper:

Any topic can be assessed on any paper and topics may be assessed more than once.

Top tips when revising for Drama:

- 1) Read and **act out** moments from 'An Inspector Calls' so that you have *practical experience* of playing the characters across the whole of the play.
- 2) Make specific notes about moments from 'Warhorse' to fit onto an A4 page. Include sketches and *specific drama terminology*.
- 3) Research the **social and historical context** of 'An Inspector Calls' so that you know what the playwright wanted his *audience* to feel and experience.

Paper 2 (Human Geography) – Wednesday 5th June 2024 – 1 hour 30 mins
Paper 3 (Geographical skills)- Friday 14th June 2024 – 1 hour 30 minutes

Topics that are assessed on each paper:

Paper 1 – *Section A - Natural Hazards* (tropical storms – Typhoon Haiyan case study, tectonic hazards – Nepal and New Zealand earthquake case studies, climate change, UK extreme weather – Beast from the East example). *Section B – Living World* (ecosystems – UK pond example, tropical rainforests – Madagascar case study, cold environments – Svalbard case study). *Section C – Physical Landscapes in the UK* – Coastal landscapes (Dorset coast example) and River landscapes (River Tees and Morpeth examples).

Paper 2 – *Section A – Urban challenges* (London case study, Nairobi case study, sustainable urban living – Freiburg example). *Section B – Economic world* (development – Tunisia example, NEE case study- Pakistan, UK Economy). *Section C – Resource management* (Food option studied, Agrica – example)

Top tips when revising History

- 1) Be clear on the order of events, you don't have to learn hundreds of dates but you do need to know sequences. Timelines are useful for this.
- 2) Don't learn isolated facts – think 'how might this information be useful in the exam?' 'what type of question might it help with?'
- 3) Try to write questions based around the ideas such as change, causes, consequences. Use your mock exam papers to help you.

Paper 1 – 90 minutes

Paper 2 – 120 minutes

Paper 1: Principles of Computer Science

Introduces students to the central processing unit (CPU), computer memory and storage, data representation, wired and wireless networks, network topologies, system security and system software. It also looks at ethical, legal, cultural and environmental concerns associated with computer science.

Paper 2: Application of Computational Thinking

Students apply knowledge and understanding of computational thinking: algorithms, programming techniques, producing robust programs and computational logic. This is a practical paper using Python on the PC.

Top 5 tips when revising French & Spanish:

1. Little and often – 5 minutes of Memorise 3x week; learn a speaking topic per week
2. Revise your tenses – past/present/future as a minimum
3. Attend the Revision & Intervention sessions
4. Use the ‘Love it’ or ‘Complexity & variety’ sheets to help improve complexity in writing and speaking
5. Complete timed practice questions (L/R/W + translation) + use your revision guides.....!

Subject: Music

Number of exams and length: 1 listening examination of approximately 1 hour 15 mins

Topics that are assessed on the paper:

Pop Music: Rock 'n' Roll of the 1950s and 1960s, Rock Anthems from 1970s and '80s, Pop Ballads of the 1970s, '80s and '90s, Solo Artists from 1990 to Present Day

The Concerto through Time: The Baroque, Classical & Romantic Concerto

Film and Video Game Music

Rhythms of the World: Eastern Mediterranean Music (this includes Palestinian, Israeli and Greek Music), Indian Classical, Bhangra Music, African Drumming, Samba, Calypso (song and steel pans).

You will also be asked to follow a score, recognise key and time signatures, add Italian terms to a score and complete missing notes in a melody line. You will need to be able to recognise orchestral, world and band instruments by ear.

How do I revise?

The key message when revising is that it must be **active** and not passive. Passive would be just reading the revision guide then finishing and going to watch TV. Active revision is anything that involves thinking, making a decision or doing.

Instead of just reading it and then having a cup of tea...

- ***Can you reduce the information down to half the size in note form? Can you reduce it further down to just keywords?***
- ***Can you draw pictures to help you remember it?***
- ***Can you summarise the information in 5 key points then put them in order of importance?***
- ***Can you draw a mind map and link the information on a topic together?***
- ***Can you turn the page of information into a 10 question quiz that you can get someone to test you on?***
- ***Can you make flash cards with keywords on one side and definitions on the other?***
- ***Can you make a podcast about the thing you are learning about?***



How do I revise?

Once you feel like you've revise a topic, you need to **test yourself** to see if you really have and practice applying that knowledge. If the subject you are revising for involves writing them you must practice writing your answers

You can do this by answering questions in the revision guides, or by answering the relevant pages in a workbook or internet site.

It is extremely important that you mark the questions **yourself** – there is no point in doing questions if you don't know if they are right or not

Exam practice – build up to trying exams, there are not many practice papers so use them wisely! Make sure you mark them afterwards – get help from someone if you struggle. If you can't help looking at the answers, give them to someone responsible!



Revision activities ideas you could try

- **1. Flash cards** - These are nice and easy to make, just make sure that you are using them in the most effective way. Have questions on one side and answers on the other. You can make a few at a time and add to it over different sessions. Use other people to quiz you e.g. you friends, parent, carer sibling etc.
- **2. Brain dump** - These are good to do early in the revision process to set the scene for how you're feeling on each unit and help to figure out where to start.
- **3. Audio recoding's** - Either make your own on your phone and listen back or use Spotify. Simply search GCSE Seneca in Spotify and find lots of great short recordings on all kinds of subjects.
- **4. Past paper questions** - These are great to do after working through a few of the other techniques, a nice way to assess your progress and where you might want to do more work. Here is the link to lots of past paper questions- <https://www.cognitoresources.org/>
- **5. Videos** - YouTube has so many videos, there is lots of great resources on there, particularly good ones are TedEd, Cognito & Free Science Lessons.
- **6. Revision Games** - Again, there is lots on offer when it comes to quiz style games... Educake, Kahoot, Blooket, Quizizz & so many more.
- **7. Mind maps** - All you need is paper to get started with this method of revision. This is ideal to use towards the end of your revision, what links can you make within lesson topics?
- **8. Teach someone else** - Grab a friend, parent, carer, peer, sibling, cousin... anyone! Tell them what you have learnt. Let them ask you a question too. Light a match, can you talk through an exam answer the whole time it is alight?
- **9. Look/cover/write/check** - This is a great way to learn formulae, or definitions.
- **10. Flowcharts** - Last but not least, flowcharts are useful for either linking ideas or great at breaking large ideas down into smaller chunks that are easier to recall.



The Pressures of Exams



Some stress isn't always a bad thing. It focuses us at a time when it really matters.

But it is crucial to find the perfect balance, somewhere between not caring how you do to being so anxious that you are not able to perform in the exam.

What can you do?

- **Revise-** It sounds obvious but you will become more anxious if you haven't done any work. Revising will give you more confidence in your ability to perform in the exam.
- **Sleep-** Revising until the early hours won't help anyone. You won't sleep well, which means in the morning you're tired and grumpy. That's not going to help anyone is it?
- **Ban the socials-** Checking your notifications late into the evening before a big exam is distracting and the light from your phone/ tablet/ laptop actually tricks the brain into thinking the light is morning sunlight and 'wakes' you up. Plus who knows what someone has tagged you in or written on your wall. You don't need that drama!
- **Meditate!-** If the pre-exam build up throws you off you're A-Game then try some guided meditation (sessions in the Hub before the exams)- proven to calm and relax you, focusing the mind.
- **Speak to us!-** Every year we have students who struggle with exams. You're not on your own! Pop in, email us, ask your tutor to email/ speak to us, ask parents to call in. However, you need to do it, let us know. Talking to someone will always make you feel better. We've got so many tips and tricks but unless we know about you we can't help!

What can we do?

- **Self-help resources-** we use some fantastic resources that have been written by professionals for students around exam times. Why not pop into the Hub to pick up a pack or you can sign up to receive 6 emails that firstly explain what anxiety is and then how to manage it- Go to www.danreganhypnotherapy.co.uk/issues/exam-fear to sign up for the free emails.
- **Offer support and strategies to manage anxiety-** After your mocks we're going to run some sessions with Mrs Rockley to explore what the right support for you is.
- **Tweaks to exam arrangements**
- **Guided meditation-** As mentioned earlier, meditation is hugely successful in focusing and calming you down. We'll be running some sessions to teach you how to do it. Then, if you're getting stressed, you can try to calm yourself down. Any time, any place!

Part 2: Doing the habit

1. Try to use a room or part of a room that is only for revision, that way you will associate working with being there and distractions will be easier to avoid. Which location (s) can you think of?
2. Sit a chair and a table/desk (not on your bed).
3. Tell someone you're starting revision and tell them to ask you what you will be doing in that time. Who can you tell, share our plan with?
4. Be very specific about when, where and what you will revise. Stick to the plan!
5. Keep distractions away – no TV, no phone, no computer game. Make it easy to avoid temptation by making your environment temptation free. Where will you put your phone, who could you give it to?
6. Set a clear end time so you know when you can stop. Stick to the plan.
7. Treat it like a job that needs doing, if it's not a school day, get up for work.
